1/48 With BMW 003 Engines

Continuing to amaze me, Hobby Boss has released another new variant of the Me 262. This time the BMW 003 powered version. As it turned out only two were built. Since the 003s had considerably less thrust, speed dropped off to an unacceptable 496mph. The Jumo powered A-1a had a top speed of 540mph.

As you would expect, the kit is the same as their other offerings but with one different sprue – for the engines (No you don't get both engines) and a new decal sheet. Coming in a sturdy top opening box with excellent artwork, the kit has 181 gray styrene parts (on 11 sprues packed in plastic bags), 4 clear parts packaged in separate plastic bags and cushioned with foam), and a metal nose weight incorporating the nose wheel well. Also included are four X-4 air to air guided missiles – although they were never flown on the Me 262. There are also two different nose wheels – ribbed and smooth tread along with two nose gear struts (that appear to be identical

to me). There are no R4M missiles (which were fitted to the Me 262). The interior of the fuse-lage and engine nacelles have ribbing and frames so you can place the internal equipment inside and leave the access hatch open to display it all. Why the engine nacelles have internal ribs and such is curious since no engines are included, only turbine front and rear faces. Maybe in the future? Likewise, there are no pilot or ground crew figures. The rudder is the only control surface that can be posed.

The moldings look very good with little or no flash. The sink marks above the landing gear wells on the wing top surface, evident on other offerings, thankfully are not on this kit. Ejector pin marks are very subtle and generally in unobtrusive places. The surface finish is dull for good paint adhesion. There are the usual subdued panel lines and rivet detail even though the 262 was generally puttied on most seams.

The instructions are on an 8 page fold out and include a parts tree illustration. The instructions are of the now usual exploded view format and there is a separate full color sheet of 4 views for painting and marking information for two aircraft, E3+32 and 078. Registration is very good. The swastikas, unfortunately, are of the split type to permit sale in Germany. Paint call outs are by RLM number with references to Mr. Hobby, Vallejo, Model Master, Tamiya and Humbrol.

Personally, I can't comment on the fit but "Scale Aircraft Modelling" gave the recce version, Me 262A-1a/U3, high marks for fit.

All in all, a good kit of a rare variant well worth the price.



Next month we will try to feature landing gear details.








Figure 4: Jim Boloukos's Lotus 72 in the works
