1/24 Atlantis Double Kit – **ALFA 158 & LAGO-TALBOT F.1** #6001

Atlantis Model Company, as you may or may not know, has bought up the molds and rights to several old line manufacturers and plans on releasing them again. One of the first that I am aware of is this release of the old SMER offerings of the Alfa Romeo Type 158 (or 159 depending on what you read and where) and the SMER Lago-Talbot (or Talbot-Lago). Both are 1/24th scale with the Alfa molded in red plastic and the Lago-Talbot molded in blue. Each is bagged separately with the clear parts in a separate bag therein. The instructions are even the original SMER instructions. As you would expect, given the vintage of the kits, there is some flash. There is a decal sheet with race numbers and dashboard dials. They look good. There is a rudimentary engine and suspension and the hood comes of so the engine can be displayed. The Alfa has 46 bright red parts including a few clear bits for the wheels and windscreen. The wire wheels are represented by rims with clear plastic discs that have the spokes engraved in them, the idea being to fill the scribe lines with silver and polish the clear disc. There is a clear windshield but it will need polishing or just substitute a piece of clear acetate. It is not just a slot car without the motor. It should make up into a decent Alfa 158/159. One surprise is that the leaf springs for the suspension are very petite and will look great. There are some sink marks I noticed on the hubs of the wheels but non on the body parts.

The Lago-Talbot has 55 very blue parts (it's French you know) including the clear parts. It has the same clear plastic discs scribed to represent the spokes and a windscreen. The exhaust pipe is a cool 6 into 1 affair that will look great when polished up. Again, the leaf springs are petite – one transverse in the front and two longitudinally mounted in the rear. All the comments on the Alfa apply equally to the Lago-Talbot.

I can't say how accurate they are and there is not much detail but they are the only game in town in 1/24th and I think Atlantis is to be congratulated for resurrecting these molds and reissuing the kits. Now how do we go about encouraging them to re release some more like the Cooper, Vanwall, Lotus, Gordini, BRM and a host of others from the late '40s and '50s.

P.S. I just found out that these are actually the old Merit molds from the 50s!! Repop put out some of these a few years ago for a short time but is no longer doing it.



Derived from the Severski SEV-3 amphibian, the P-35 was the first fighter from the Severski/Kartveli team. It ultimately evolved into the P-41 and P-43 and then into the P-47 Thunderbolt. It was assigned the designation P-35 (no suffix) when 77 were ordered by the USAAF in a competition with Curtiss, who received an order for 200 P-36 aircraft. First deliveries started in mid 1937. Additionally, on June 29th, 1939 the Swedish government contracted with Severski for 15 EP-1-106 fighters (an export variant of the P-35 with modifications specifically for the Swedes who designated them J-9) and on October 11th, 1939 ordered another 45 followed, on January 1st, 1940, by another order for 60 more. The last 60 of the Swedish contract were impressed into the USAAF and 45 (Now designated P-35A by the USAAF) were immediately sent directly to the Philippine Islands for the defense of the islands. Of the remaining 15, designated RP-35A, most were assigned to various training units in the US.

Hobbycraft came out with two boxings of the P-35. The P-35A boxing is HC1553 while the P-35 Racer (AP-7) is HC1554. They are essentially the same kit with the difference being in the decals and lack of guns on the racer. The moldings are the same in each kit.

The Kit P-35A kit is molded in gray styrene with 71 parts plus 4 clear parts. There are decals for two aircraft – one USAAF P-35A of the 34th Pursuit Squadron in 1941 and the other a J-9 of Unit F8 in 1942. There are extra aircraft numbers for the Swedish aircraft. The instructions are of the exploded view type and are adequate but lack color callouts for the cockpit and landing gear. Some photos in the booklet "P-35 Mini in Action #1" show a silver painted cockpit and



landing gear. While photos of the AFM P-35A, taken by the author, show it to have a bronze green or cockpit interior.

The molds are nice given their age 1993? with crisp but a little heavy) recessed panel lines and adequate locating pins. There are a few sink marks in the cockpit area of the fuselage and some minor flash on some parts. The main landing gear struts have a few ejection pin marks but they will be hidden by the wheel trousers. The wings consist of a one piece lower surface and two upper surface parts thus insuring accurate dihedral. Cockpit detail is admirable with 14 parts. The engine also is nice with 5 parts. The instrument panel is also quite nice with raised bezels and pointers. The cowl is said to be a tad small causing a problem with the lower scoop. The canopy fit is said to be good in the closed position but sits too high in the open position. The leading edge of the wings must be drilled out for the wing guns and the landing gear struts.

It really is a nice kit with just a few niggles, which are to be expected given the age. And, it is the only game in town in 1/48th scale.


P-35A

This P-35A was photographed at the then Air Force Museum (Now the National Museum of the US Air Force) in October 6th 1981 and December 4th 1982. Notice that the cockpit appears to be in Bronze Green and Black common to that era and the interior of the landing gear wells, including the tail wheel, and flaps are either natural aluminum or painted silver.
