Thunder over the Reich Flying the Luftwaffe's He 162 Jet Fighter

This is an easy to read narration of the experiences of a German flier in World War II. In some respects I was disappointed in that the first 80 or so pages are devoted to his experiences against the Russians on the northern front flying a Bf 110. This part consists of rather typical war stories of flying (if you can call shooting and being shot at typical). Underlying the prose is a description of how hazardous this was, and how lucky Herr Wollenweber was. At the end of 1943 (Page 80) the book becomes more interesting(to me anyway) as he enters, first, Fw 190 training then Me 163 Rocket fighter training and

ultimately He 162 training. This part of the book alone makes it worthwhile. The chaotic conditions the Luftwaffe was operating in is presented in overwhelming clarity. His Me 163 training was stopped for lack of rocket fuel and all his He 162 flying totaled only 12 flights, most of which were ferry flights. On the few rare occasions he engaged in combat with the He 162 his guns would not fire! Despite this meager flight experience in the He 162 he rose to be Kapitan of 2. Staffel of JG.1. The last several weeks were spent ferrying the planes to different airfields due to Allied advances on the ground. The last several days were spent killing time waiting for the British to take over their planes at Leck. They had all 22 of them lined up as if getting ready for a review. In fact, there is a diagram on page 138 identifying each aircraft by Werk Number and specific aircraft code (i.e. Red 3 etc). As an aside - he categorically states that the legend if a He 162 downing a Typhoon is incorrect. "The incident never happened".


Appendix 1 is a reproduction of the Preliminary Flight Handbook with English translation. Appendix 2 is a cutaway drawing. An interesting part of this drawing is the inclusion of a RATO unit to be mounted immediately after the main landing gear wheel well. I have never seen any reference anywhere of the He 162 having provision for such devices. Appendix 3 reviews captured aircraft and museum exhibits while Appendix 4 has two view drawings of a He 162C with swept forward wings and butterfly tail and a He 162D with swept back wings also with a butterfly tail. At the end of the book there is a four page index.

The book is an excellent reference, well written and is an enjoyable read. Recommended.

There are three iterations of the Testors U-2 still more or less available in 1/48 scale. The original U-2A by hawk was also produced by Testors but is hard to find. The U-2C Kit is basically the same as the U-2A with the intakes enlarged (to accommodate the increased air flow required by new engines. I built the Hawk U-2A many years ago and it was a nice kit that went together well and looked right when finished. I presume the same can be said of the U-2C. The U-2A was also available in a plated version which was very shiny.

The U-2C clearly is showing its age. It was brought out in 1979 and the basic molds were from the U-2A which predated it. It has lots of flash and some sink marks typical of the era. But... it will make up into a nice model without too much work. There is little detail except for the instrument panel decal and pilot figure. The wheel wells are bare and the struts and wheels are rudimentary but useable. On the plus side it has a handling trolley and wing supports which the other kits do not.

The U-2R and TR-1 kits have new molds and are a notch better, having minimal flash and no apparent sink marks. Both kits utilize the same sprues. The both have the parts to build a two seater TR-1B but only the TR-1 instructions show them and, of course, only the TR-1 has the decals for the TR-1B. They both have nice decals and cockpit tubs. Not the detail of modern kits but adequate. Canopies for all 3 kits

are nice and clear and of two pieces so you can pose them open. There are holes in both wings for the outrigger pogos (this is true of all three kits). None of the kits has an engine and all have raised panel lines. There are no camera ports. The instructions are very much the same for all three kits with only modifications to reflect the different versions. The air brakes are open. The U-2R and TR-1 kits have some useful detail photos, in the instruction sheets, Cockpit, landing gear, wing tips, wheel wells and such with the U-2R having a few more photos. All the kits are packaged in a crushable open ended box with all the parts bagged in a slide in tray. The colors are called out in Testors numbers and FS numbers.

All in all, considering their age these are all decent kits that will build up nicely and look the part, particularly if you sand off the raised panel lines and rescribe them. Recommended.

Photo Essay of a U-2A and U-2CT



Here is what is in my collection of U-2 photos. The first is the U-2A (U-2D?) photographed at the National Museum of The USAF in 1981 before it was hung from the ceiling and the second is the U-2CT photographed at Duxford in the UK in 1993. Both had the canopy closed so full on photos of the instrument panels was not possible. However, the cockpit colors in general are readily apparent as are the side console configurations. From what I have read the main

difference between the A and C was the engine and intake size with some C models having a longer nose and some having canoes for additional equipment. Some sources say The NMUSAF's U-2 is a U-2D – A U-2A with the Q bay modified for a second crewmember to operate specialized equipment. The U-2CT is a two seater trainer version. The cockpit and landing gear well colors are interesting. Enjoy!


