Another end of a RepLIcon show. I would like to thank all of the LISMS members who attended to help make the show. We had 214 walk-in visitors and 51 modelers who entered the contest, . Nineteen of our members attended who didn't enter. These numbers have been declining slowly over the past five years and these numbers are the

worst yet. As for vendor attendance we had 29 who filled all the table space to the max. I won't be surprised if they drop off from attending if we have further shows. Even the children's Make 'n Take had 3 participating children out of 24 attended. What is sad was a tremendous lack of attendance and participation from IPMS chapters within driving range. No one attended from our New Jersey neighbor, yet several of us went to their show a week before RepLIcon. No one from NENY, who is hosting a regional on May 2nd attended. Our regional coordinator, Doc, attended but only to work at a vendor, and one of his chapter members of the Hudson Valley chapter. We cannot continue hosting shows like this. It isn't worth the many hours of computer time and vendor communication I have to do when I can be building models in my retirement. Doug has taken over work of a VP as well as the treasurer since Roger took ill. Fred is President of the Suffolk Chapter and runs all our club and show contests. We three cannot continue this quantity of effort without other members stepping up. Over the next month decisions will be made that may change what we are doing. You should make your BEST EFFORT to attend this next meeting if you want a say in the direction of this club.

I spoke to one of the large vendors at our show about model prices. He is appalled as much as we modelers are over the past two years. His discounts aren't even enough to bring down the prices to the modeler's affordability. Instead of modeler's buying two Dragon armor kits, they buy one now. I looked over his RepLIcon stock that he brought, and found kits I purchased for \$41.00 are now \$52.50. What's even worse is that it's the same kit with different decals and box art. In fact, my previous purchase has an aluminum barrel. The new kit has a solid plastic barrel with a partial drilled muzzle. Other quality kit manufacturers are following the pattern. Manufacturer's prices are going to hurt the vendors we have at shows who can offer the cheapest prices. If the prices continue to rise, at the rate of my school taxes each year, the vendors have to increase their prices and so it affects our buying purchases. Our declining show attendance is not helping vendor sales and eventually we will see the decline of vendors.

May 2nd will be the first one day Noreastcon in Region I ever. I wasn't going to attend, but because I am President of LISMS, I felt I should make my best effort to be there for my support, more than they did for our support.

I am interested in knowing what their attendance numbers will be for a one day Noreastcon. Fred and Bill are considering to attend as well.




Venator — Romanian HunterThe I.A.R. 80 and I.A.R. 81 in Ultimate Detail

A few years ago I reviewed "The I.A.R. 80 & I.A.R. 81 Airframe, Systems & Equipment" by Radu Brinzan and thought it was a good book on this little known Romanian fighter and that it would probably be the definitive work on it. Well.... History has proven me wrong (again).

Brinzan has come out with a much better and more thorough work - "Venator - Romanian Hunter - I.A.R. 80 and I.A.R. 81 in Ultimate Detail". It is what the title says! He does this by adding substantially to his earlier work. There is a lot of new information, photos, and drawings presented here. It is a much more complete presentation. One gets the feeling that the author wanted to present all the additional information and photos that resulted from his first book. There are many photographs of aircraft wrecks as the Romanians were very thorough about documenting and analyzing all the crashed aircraft. Photo quality varies from excellent to blurry. There are 49 color photographs - 13 are wartime photos while 36 are component photographs. There are also 23 color illustrations, 60 color profiles and 4 view drawings with many other line drawings. The selection of photographs and artwork will make modelers happy.

Apparently there were 450 I.A.R. 80 and 81s built. This book has high quality color profiles and 4 views of 66 of these graceful aircraft.

So, I will say it again – this will probably be the definitive work on the I.A.R. 80 and 81. We are fortunate it is so modeler friendly. If you are ever going to build that LTD IAR 80A kit you will love this book. Recommended.



Etzel Speed Classic's 1/25 Scale model of Frank Lockhart's 1928 Stutz Black Hawk Land Speed Racer \$85.00 from American Racing Miniatures at PO Box 96, Round Hill, VA 201414

So what the heck is 1928 Stutz Black Hawk, you ask? It's single seat race car that was designed to run at over 200 MPH on the hard packed sand near Dayton Beach, Florida. The car has the art deco look of its time with a rather small narrow bodied car painted in white with the wheels mounted on streamline axles and enclosed in unpainted aluminum spats. Frank Lockhart was very successful driver on the west coast dirt tracks and in 1926 went to the speedway to observe the Indy 500 and visit with a friend. He ended in the car of a driver who fell ill. Frank went on to dominate

and win the race, becoming the first true rookie winner of the Indy 500. Lockhart was also an innovator. He became an expert in supercharging as well as aerodynamics and is credited on developing the intercooler.

He was interested is setting the overall world land speed record after setting the 91 cubic inch class land speed record of 171.02 MPH. Frank secured the financial backing from the Stutz Motorcar Company along with adding his own winning received from several racing track wins including the Indy 500 from the year before. Lockhart began the design and construction of the Black Hawk in the Stutz factory building in Indianapolis

Chris Etzel was a one man company who designed and kitted several different multi- media kits many years ago





under the Etzel Speed Classics name. He would sell kits from ad's that were placed in the car and model magazines at the time. Yeah, we're talking pre -internet days. He lost interest in the modeling world and quit the hobby, got into music from what I heard. For many recent years, the only place to buy his kits was on evil -bay.

Ed Mautner and Tom Faletti, two modelers from Virginia purchased the model resin parts, masters and models and started to sell them under the American Racing Miniatures name. They have this kit and three other Indy 500 racing cars, along with a few different 1950's resin racing tires and wheel sets for sale. I purchased my kit directly from them at the NNL East back in April of this year.

Okay, now to the kit. The Stutz Black Hawk is a curbside (No Engine), including a full cockpit and is designed for a trouble free construction. The kit consists of 22 resin castings, plus an additional 8 white metal casting pieces and a straight pin used for the transmission shifter. The resin parts require just a little clean up with sandpaper and a good washing to remove the mold release. I had to add a small amount of putty on one of the wheel axles due to a small air pocket with the resin casting and once painted up, one would never know it. The white metal requires the normal files, sandpaper and 0000 steel wool to first clan up then polish the metal parts to a nice metal shine. I primed all the parts with several mist coats of Tamiya White primer and sanded with 1500 wet and dry paper. Then, I used Testor

Model Master non- buffing aluminum paint for most of the natural metal parts. The wheel spats parts were clear coated using Mr. Hobby Super Clear Gloss spray paint. The white body was paint with automotive dupli-color pure white spray paint and then clear coated with dupli – color paint. They recommend using 5 minute epoxy for the assembly to allow enough time to adjust things, and if need be, to pull parts apart for readjustments. I agree that this is way to go and not to use crazy glue.

The kit instructions are very detailed (eight pages long) and have some 25 clear color photos to guide you along for each of the 11 steps. They are well written, easy to understand and if you follow them you shouldn't have any problems. You will need to buy a one 1/16th inch aluminum tube for the steering shafts, which isn't include with the kit and should have been included in my opinion. Yeah, the cost is all of 40 cents. The first three pages of the instructions cover the history of both Frank Lockhart and this car. There's some really good interesting stuff about Frank Lockhart and the car if you are into history.

Bottom line: This kit is highly recommended and was fun to build. It's not a bad kit to start with as your first multimedia kit since the quality of resin and white metal is good. The price is in line with similar automotive kits. These resin kits don't go together as quickly as a plastic kit, but that part of the charm, besides, you'll never see any plastic kit of this model, so the resin kit is the only option.



With 50 models on the table for our Spring Meeting Contest I would say it was a resounding success. The caliber of the models was, as usual, excellent with Ships, Aircraft, Armor and Misc. models on display due in large part to Bob's interview with a reporter from a local newspaper. There was a fair amount of discussion amongst many - What kind of paint did you use? How did you do that? Is that the Tamiya kit? Is that really the same scale as that? A good time seemed to be had by all.




