

1/48 XP-77

by Czech Model # 4803



The Plane

From the instruction sheet: The Bell XP-77 was conceived in late 1941 as a point defense interceptor made largely from wood – a non-strategic material. The idea was to design a light weight, low cost, nimble interceptor that could be quickly deployed around U. S. cities and overseas installations. Lacking great range, the aircraft were to be disassembled and transported in USAAF cargo aircraft such as the C-46 Commando.

The Ranger V-770-9 supercharged, inverted V-12-cylinder engine was originally specified for the design, but the lower powered V770-6 was

used as a substitute. The lower power of the engine and the increase in weight of the airframe substantially lowered the original performance estimates. The aircraft was also designed to employ a single 20mm cannon and two .50 caliber machine guns, however the cannon was dropped to save weight. Due to contractual difficulties and protracted development, the XP-77 did not take to the air until the summer of 1944. By this time there was no need for such an aircraft as the XP-77. This combined with upward spiraling costs and lower performance led the program being terminated in December 1944.

The Kit

Well, what do you get? You get an end opening box with a red, black and white illustration of the XP-77 on the top and a line drawing 3 view on the back. Inside is a bagged styrene sprue with 35 parts, another bag with14 resin parts, 2 vacuum formed canopies, a 4-page instruction sheet with 4 assembly steps, a parts tree diagram, and another 3 view with some decent color notes. There is no PE and no pilot figure.

The plastic parts are low pressure molded so the gates are not exactly petite, but they are not bad either.

The parts look good in shape and surface finish. There are no locating pins and sockets except on the roots of the horizontal stabiliz-

ers. 2 short pins on the stabilizers and two small holes on the aft fuselage halves. The wings have a single lower surface and two upper- surfaces so the dihedral will be set. The recessed panel lines are very petite and should be deepened a bit. There is a recess on each died of the fuselage for the exhaust exit but no pipes.

The resin parts are by True Details and so are very nice but there are no details on the instrument faces of the Instrument panel, just shallow holes. I think if you have some instrument faces in your decal box you could just cut or punch them out to fit, keep them on the backing, put a dollop of white glue on them and they would look great. The cockpit parts have only basic detail on the sides but that may be all that there was. The seat is very nice and has the belts molded on. The wheels are OK but could be better. The engine is cast as a blob with only the front having detail but that is all you would see through the opening in the front cowling.

The decals in my kit are poor in that the blue in the national insignia has bled into the white of the star and bars. Aside from that they are OK. There are numbers that enable you to depict either of the 2 prototypes.

All-in-all an OK kit. Its greatest asset is it is the only 1/48 game in town and not likely to be produced by a main stream manufacturer. That being said, with a little work it should make up into a decent model. All the basics are there.



 Work in a well-ventilated area. Avoid breathing in the fumes from paints and glues. These fumes are dangerous. Do not work near an open flame.





The Yak-9U was a late version of the very successful Yak-3 and Yak-7 designs and was produced in large quantities in the latter stages of World War 2. 3921 were produced between April 1944 to August 1945. It differed from its predecessors by having the fabric fuselage panels replaced with 3mm plywood skinning, the WK107 engine of 1500 hp was used, the oil coolers and radiator were relocated, and the aerodynamics were refined. Performance was substantially improved.

It was liked by its pilots and was considered a very forgiving aircraft, making it ideally suited for the new pilots then coming out of pilot's school. And, although the WK107 was never fully developed, field mechanics took to the new engine without difficulty.

This Aircraft

The Yak-9U shown here was in sad shape when purchased in Siberia by Mr. Doug Champlin in 1992. It was restored by the Russian company AVIA-M

in Moscow for Mr. Champlin. When it was completed and shipped to the museum in 1995 it was reassembled with the assistance of AVIA-M engineer Sergey Kotov. The aircraft is a real Yak-9U with a WK107 engine, not a conversion of a related airframe.



The left-wing flap interior is a yellowish green color but does not look like zinc chromate. It is the same color as shown in photo 7 of the main landing gear strut well.



Left side of the cockpit. Seat belts appear to be silver gray with orange backing. In all likelihood they are not vintage.


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

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
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




