1/35 Takom's German 35.5cm Howitzer



Before I build a kit, I search online for reviews just to find out what other modelers thought of it. Not "In the Box" kit reviews which all rave about the wonderful the detail is, but true 'build' reviews that tell you how the parts go together. I didn't find any build reviews of this one since this kit was relatively new when I decided to tackle it over a year ago. I never built a Takom kit. Prior to this release, Takom had manufactured the German Twin 128cm Twin Flak kit and I bought it because there wasn't anything like it. I was hasty in buying it, then read a build review of it that warned to prepare for a fair amount of puttying. I held off assembling it for a while. A fellow hobby club member introduced me to this 35.5 cm Howitzer and I was impressed. I shelved the 128cm Twin Flak to build this beast and hoped this kit would be different with a better engineered fit. At the time I did this, I decided to take some pictures as I went along. Not usual for me to do it but some voice in my ear suggested it.





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The Instruction book was clear but I tend to take liberties and bounce around the subassemblies. I glued the barrel halves first. It definitely needed putty as you can see in the picture. The inside diameter of the barrel is quite large clearly able to see down the barrel. I added putty to the seam inside as well. There will be filing and sanding ahead. The barrel is so long I had to dig into my manly man toolbox for the long round file able to reach the center from both sides. Then I taped a piece of sandpaper to the file to get a finer smoothness.






As per the following pictures I am showing the breach and body assemblies joined together with the five recoil pieces. They show the top and sides where putty is necessary. Sorry I did not take pictures of the bottom. The long barrel will be inserted into this later on. Warning here, don't join the breach and body assemblies with the five joining pieces as I did until you read through this review. That also delays gluing the barrel in place.


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


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Before you assemble the lower structure for this beast of a howitzer, putty up the sink holes and smooth them out. The pictures below show both sides assembled after sanding the sink holes smooth. These sink holes were easy compared to what was to come.


A positive note here! You get a break from all this puttying. The howitzer cradle structure is putty free. My fingers got a reprieve from sanding, but there was an ample amount of filing out the seams all along the edges.

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




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The platforms are next in line for work, and you should plan on spending a lot of time on these. Building a model isn't only what you see from above or eye level. If you can see upward a little, below eye level, you must fix what will be visible to the eyes. I have never encountered so many sink holes in a kit as these. Look close as the sink holes are surrounded by raised frames. After working on sanding a couple, I considered cutting sheet plastic and gluing them in, but the surrounding frames were too shallow. Putty them up and prepare the sand paper for when dry. Oh yeah. You need small fingers.



The completed pictures are needed to point out what happened when assembling the final product. I started to test fit the assemblies and it appeared to me that the howitzer had to be in the horizontal position at all times. If you try to elevate the gun, the breach was too far back to de-

scend below the decking. I like displaying the massive guns ready to fire. There wasn't any choice but to reduce the distance the easiest means possible, the five joining pieces. Even if I left the howitzer built in a horizontal position, it would have been obvious to the eye the long overlap beyond the floor door. The picture shows the floor door in the open position.

Test fit the hydraulic arms if you wish to elevate and lower the gun movement. There are pin locaters in the upper tube that have to be removed before gluing it together or you will have to drill or file inside. The long triangular shape support rods in front of the hydraulic arms are sketchy to work in a location as per instructions. Be careful here before gluing in place. (insert Picture 12)

As you can see, my clearance is very close with the floor door. With the gun raised the boldness of it will distract the eyes, I hope.

This picture obviously tells it all. The ammo diameter is a misfit for the barrel diameter. Interesting....! But which is correct to scale? I waited to build in 1/35 scale for fifty years. If the engineering is anything like this kit, I'll have to take a lot of breaks. Oh yes, I sold the German Twin 128cm Flak kit.



This being my first Takom kit was really a building disappointment. Most kits have minor issues with parts fitting perfectly, but It took a lot of effort to alter the engineering fit flaws to make this howitzer look decent. Put together, it still looks massive and bold. I stay away from other Takom purchases except a recent German V2 and trailer kit that I waited to build in 1/35 scale for fifty years. If the engineering is anything like this kit, I'll have to take a lot of breaks. Oh yes, I sold the German Twin 128cm Flak kit.
