



Kit Review - Soviet Russia's WWII Long Gun by Robert DeMaio




Most times when I build kits, I tend to remember the snags, glitches, bad instructions, wrong paint color call outs, and above all, instruction sheet arrows pointing a part to nowhere. This being a premium kit I figured it had to be complete and no problem building. It didn't take


long to prove me wrong. This kit had all the above that took me more patience to fight through and ask, why do I build these? This is Dragon kit 6359 Su-100 Tank Destroyer premium edition with an aluminum barrel and a PE fret of straps, belts, and various small pieces. I am including a few instruction sheet pictures, as I have never done so before in my reviews, to alert builders how bad these were. In step 2, part A6 swivels in place does not indicate what rotation to cement it. There isn't a part behind it to hold it in place so what do you do? I have had the same part on other armored vehicles, so I dump this into "my parts to add later" container since I took it off the tree. Add the second one as well. You will add and rotate these in place when ready to add the tracks in place.



In step 4 the shaded wheel edges parts D1 and D2 do not indicate a color. Are we supposed to know if they were made of rubber or steel? Oh wait! You should have a library of resource books with detailed pictures.




I did not take a picture of step 5 because I can use step 6 to accomplish what I need to point out. Plastic part H5 or MA19 (PE19) can be used for the grill. I opted for the plastic part and prevented more grey hairs to grow on my head using the PE. But instead of B15 plastic part with a molded-on grill, I used P1 on the open space to glue the PE screen (not seen to the right in the step). I also used MA2 PE flaps under it.



In step 6 there is a small mini assembly of 6 track links and the rest is up to you to figure out how to put all and how many track links together. My trick is to make an upper and lower set that when put together on the tank, they can be glued as one.

In steps 5 and 6 is the first time the top half of the vehicle is worked on. I noticed the top where there are hatch openings, that top overlaps the sides a little. Definitely strange so I checked all include small parts for inside the hatch covers, which I leave off since you won't see them closing the hatches, the instructions and found nothing to indicate I made a mistake, so I continued. Steps 7, 8, and 9.



Now we come to part P11 and P12 to be put in place, but something wasn't right! Placement wasn't fitting well so I set them aside for later. Moving along assembling parts in steps 10, 11, and 12 were fine except after part C11 was put in place I tried to add the turret on top but was slightly too large. Hmm, too large to be a molding mistake. I went back to the past steps to no avail. I started looking through the sprue parts on the

trees and found these parts that looked like walls. I cut them off and matched them to the side walls and they filled in the top overlaps on each side of the structure. That would have moved out part C11 and the turret would have fit perfectly. I had to pop off the turret and cut off C11. It wasn't easy but successful. I glued it on the non-mentioned walls, C11 and the turret fit great! Remember parts P11 and P12? Well, they didn't exactly fit well so I went to sleep until morning. A new day didn't help for the parts fit as bad as the day before. I mounted them in a place where I felt they belonged, and that be it.

All fragile parts were left off with the tracks until the body and tracks were painted. Then I used the typical Glosscote, decals, added the tracks, grab rails and fragile parts, painted them, and used Flory Brown wash on everything, cleaned off excess wash, Dullcote was applied then used Pan Pastels to dust the vehicle.


